Spring is here, GrandPartners, with all its new growth. Our MacLaren students are growing, too, learning and mastering new skills. They are led by their teachers, whose students — our grandchildren — are reading and writing and solving math problems and doing science experiments and playing sports and making music and drawing and painting. In the midst of an ongoing national conversation about education, we can assure you that **there is no finer curriculum, no finer faculty and no finer school than ours.** Enjoy learning more!

LOWER SCHOOL: Fine Arts & Phonics The fine arts are an integral part of the MacLaren Core Knowledge Sequence curriculum. In fifth grade art, the students are learning to paint landscapes in watercolor. Take the opportunity to talk with your MacLaren student about the art he or she is creating. Pull up pictures of some of your favorite paintings to look at with your student. To your right is one of the pieces from the 5th grade.

In second grade, students are immersed in phonics and word study. They're tackling concepts many of us didn't learn until we were older: synonyms, antonyms, homophones and homonyms. Remember them? Ask your 2nd grade student to explain what she or he has learned and then take turns giving words to illustrate the concepts. (What are synonyms for "friend," or what we hope you'll join us in becoming to the Thomas MacLaren School? Supporter? Ally? Partner? YES!)



UPPER SCHOOL: Project Week Project Week in early January is a chance for students to work immersed in the

MacLaren vision of learning, not for a grade, but learning for its own sake. In **12**th **grade** this means harnessing all that these students have learned, and are learning, in math and physics and fine arts to build a bridge. Their bridges must be able to bear weight and the testing, weight upon weight, leads to bridge breaking.

In the **7**th **grade** MacLaren students study the Middle Ages. They take what they have read and discussed and use it to make models from that time: a battering ram, say, or a set of chain mail



(as pictured here), a Book of Hours, a model of a notable medieval castle. Each **6th grader** did a research paper on an animal and followed that with a diorama, like the one with the ostrich pictured to the left. The students learned all they could about habitat, distinctive characteristics, diet, mating habits, predators and prey. They learned by reading, writing and crafting. If you have a middle or high schooler, ask about Project Week. You'll learn something, too.
