THE MACLAREN WAY: Minimizing screen time for students.

You're probably concerned about the effects of too much screen time on children and teens. Faculty and staff at MacLaren have always worked to keep students awake to the wonders of the real world and away from the dangers of the virtual one. It's an integral part of the MacLaren way. Upper School students hand in their phones to the front desk at the beginning of each school day. Lower School students are introduced to books, to the printed word, not pixels. Students sing and play string instruments. They discuss what they are reading. They write. They draw. They observe the changing seasons. It's screen off, hands on at Thomas MacLaren School.

Waking to wonder springs up often. Miss Hall, who teaches fifth grade, recalls a memorable day when one of her students began softly singing a folk song learned in music class. As the students worked quietly, another student began to sing with her. And another, until the whole class was singing, in parts and in harmony. One of Miss Hall's students reports that among class favorites are "Pretty Saro," "California Song," and "Shady Grove." The next time you talk to your Lower School student, ask him or her to sing one of the songs. Maybe you can sing a folk song you learned as a child.





THE MACLAREN WAY: Learning from the best. Think of how you have learned—your job, your craft, your way. You learned by watching, and imitating, the best. Then look at this display of eleventh grade acrylic portraits. Do you recognize Vermeer's "Girl With a Pearl Earring" on the lower left? MacLaren art students (and that's all students) are taught to study masterworks and learn from them—line, shading, perspective, and color. They are asked to take that careful study and apply it to their own faces to sketch self-portraits in pencil. By twelfth grade each student will complete a self-portrait in acrylic. Don't forget to hint how nice that senior portrait would look framed on your wall.
